Last time I wrote in this space (Oct 31) I promised to speak about ways we are trying to evangelize and what all of us can contribute to this effort. Before getting to how we are evangelizing and who is evangelizing I think it's important to look more closely at what it is. Once again, in the previous article, I defined evangelization as *proclaiming the Gospel to whose who do not yet believe*. Let's look at these two elements: proclaiming the Gospel and non-believers.

Proclaiming the Gospel

The word Gospel comes from two Anglo-Saxon words *god* and *spell* which means "good story," a rendering of the Latin *evangelium* (*evangelion* in Greek), which means "good news." So to proclaim the Gospel is to proclaim the "good news." We've probably heard that before. What we might not know is that the word *evangelium* (*evangelion*) did not refer to just anybody's good news. In the time the Gospels were recorded, *evangelium* was used almost exclusively in reference to proclamations by the Roman emperor. Only his news was *evangelium*, (the good news). The emperor was viewed as a "son of the gods" and his proclamations were divinely ordained. They revealed the will of the gods. Furthermore, his proclamations–since Rome ruled almost the entire ancient world–governed the lives of all, glorifying himself, Rome, and its citizens. His words were welcomed as good news, and if they were not received in that spirit, swift and fierce punishment followed (for example crucifixion). It is in this context that the Gospel authors consciously take up this word *evangelion* and use it to name the good news from and about Jesus.

In so doing, they are making it plain: Jesus is the true son of God (Mt 27:54) made man, not the emperor of Rome nor any other person. Furthermore, he is not a god who is far off and cannot identify with us in our weakness (like an emperor far away in his Roman palace or a god on Mount Olympus). He is very near. He became one of us, a man like us in all things but sin. He brings us life (John 10:10) and reconciles us to God. And-he-remains-with- us-today. By the power of the Holy Spirit, Jesus is at work in the Church and in the hearts of those who believe in him (Romans 5:5).

So this is the Gospel, the good news. How are we to make this known? We proclaim it by our words and our deeds. First, our deeds. Our lives as followers of Jesus are different than the lives of those who do not follow him, or at least they should be. As believers, we do not set power, fame, honor, pleasure, or money as our life's goal. We live for Christ, to love him and do what pleases him. So what pleases him? That we have life and have it in abundance (John 10:10)! We no longer live in the shadow of death and sin. Like the men and women in the Gospel stories, Christ frees us from sin and shame. He heals our wounds and relieves us of burdens which we or others have fashioned. By faith, we are changed. We are no longer imprisoned by our past nor do we embrace the labels of the world. Our identity is found in Christ; we are beloved children of the Father. We now live in the freedom of a child of God (Gal 5:1), confident like a child in the Father's love for us as we work to become fully conformed to Christ. And so our lives are characterized by this love as well as joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control (Gal 5:22-23), not because we are ignorant of the suffering and struggles of life but because in that experience we have corresponding knowledge of divine love. And so we live in hope.

Second, our words. St. Peter tells us that we should "be prepared to give an answer to everyone who asks you to give the reason for the hope that you have" (1 Peter 3:15). I read recently about a famous supermodel who shared with her Instagram followers that she has cried every single day for the past few years. She then encouraged her followers by telling them that they aren't alone. So the message was this: *I'm sad and so are you; we can console each other knowing that we are both sad*. We can do better than this. We have to do better than this. I heard a minister put it this way: "We Christians don't need to convince people that Jesus lived; we need to convince them that Jesus is alive." Because sin and death are not the final word, tears and sadness are not the final word. And sin and death are not the final word because Christ is alive. His life and our relationship with him gives us life. He has made us new and continues to renew us and the Church every day.

To those who do not yet believe.

Now we know what we are to proclaim (or rather who)–Jesus Christ, our dearest friend and our savior–we can ask who needs to hear this message? The short answer is everyone. Even those who believe in Jesus grow in their faith when they hear the gospel proclaimed. For our purposes, though, I'd like to highlight some particular people. What I mean is this: the people who have left the Church, no longer value the practices of the Catholic Faith, or do not know Jesus are not strangers. I'll say it again: the people who do not know Jesus are not strangers. They are our brothers, sisters, parents, cousins, friends, co-workers, neighbors, classmates, and even fellow-parishioners. It is the people we love and the people with whom we live and work and play and–in some cases–with whom we attend Mass.

Let me relate two examples that illustrate what I mean. A woman I know recently shared her story that she didn't

get married in the Catholic Church–and no longer practices her faith–because her now husband doesn't want anything to do with it. His friendship with his wife influenced her to leave the faith which she had practiced until that point. This is no condemnation of her, but a story that's all too familiar. I do hope this is not the end of their story and their relationship with Christ and the Church. On the other hand, I also know a couple whose husband attended Church with his wife during their 30+ years of marriage because he knew it was important to her. Just a few short years ago, he came to faith in Christ, and entered the Catholic Church at the Easter Vigil. This event led their children to become confirmed in their own faith, which was waning.

What's to be done?

At this point, you've probably noticed that I tricked you. I told you I'd share what the parish is doing and all I've shared is what believers could be doing. Well it's not really a trick. *Assisting you to do Christ's work is our work*. As St. Paul tells us:

And he gave the apostles, the prophets, the evangelists, the shepherds and teachers **to equip the saints for the work of ministry**, for building up the body of Christ, until we all attain to the unity of the faith and of the knowledge of the Son of God, to mature manhood, to the measure of the stature of the fullness of Christ (Eph 4:11-13).

In this passage, you and me (we baptized men and women) are the "saints". Just as Christ associates his disciples in his work so all of us have a part to play, including those of us in the pews. Of course, our priests continue to celebrate Mass and offer Eucharistic Adoration and the parish continues to offer various opportunities for study and outreach (including faith formation classes for children and adults which I need to highlight here because one takeaway readers had from my last article was that we no longer hold religious instruction classes. That is incorrect. My apologies for causing such confusion and panic.) But we need to rediscover these practices in this new context and in some cases unlearn some habits that impede Christ's work. Over the coming weeks, we'll continue to walk through different ways we plan to support you, our parishioners in the "work of ministry" to which you are called.








PRAYER TO ST. MICHAEL
